Why The Visual Arts Are So Important...

1. Brain research confirms that Arts education strengthens student problem-solving and critical thinking skills, adding to overall academic achievement, school success, and preparation for the work world.
2. Art classes provide students a chance to develop cognitive and creative skills, and to develop their imaginations.
3. For some students Art is their motivation for coming to school and an area where they have success or excel, providing an important balance in their total educational experience.
4. The arts teach our students to be more tolerant and open through multicultural and historical perspectives and through their involvement in the creative process itself.
